



In other BCTC news:

BCTC CTP has developed a partnership with the Opportunity Middle College program with Fayette County Schools. This program was developed for high school students to take dual credit courses on campus and has expanded to the CTP program. Our first CTP student was an OMC Dual Credit student.

In just three semesters, we have gone from one student to six students. They are being exposed to a lot of subjects and work one on one with a mentor or teacher to complete coursework. OMC CTP students are graduating with 8-10 credit hours and can continue with the CTP program a year after graduation.

Because of this partnership, students are able to access college at the same time frame as their peers. We are hopeful to expand these numbers even more in the next year.

KSHEP Mentor Spotlights


Northern Kentucky University:
